

WB2JIC's Antenna Farm

Ed has been one of the originals in our chew organization, gracing our airwaves for almost two decades. His presence on air is bolstered by his constantly improving antenna farm.

One of our late ham friends, Tom-KC8QGJ, had a tongue-in-cheek saying: "Ham Sticks Don't Work!" That's why he had a dozen of them in his truck, ready for operation. Ed sends us this story of his latest experiments with Ham-

Sticks.

I've been doing some work on the "Hamstick Farm" on the side of the house. It actually started as a few single hamsticks and a triband Hustler mobile antenna for 40-



20-10 meters. Then I ran across a Procomm 3D hub that allows one feed line to connect to three hamstick antennas. I built a 1/2 inch pipe frame to hole three hubs for antennas on 160/75/60, 40/20/17 and 15/12/10 meters. Over




time the frame has continued to expand.
Now it holds the original three hubs.
I separated the 160 meter Jetstream stick

from the hub and gave it a separate mount and feed line.

Today, the frame holds three hubs for 75/60/40, 30/20/17 and 15/12/10 meter hamsticks.

The 160 meter jetstream stick, a 30 meter short hamstick, two 6 meter hamsticks, a 220 antenna, two 2 meter 5/8 wave antennas, a 40 meter hamstick dipole, a 20 Meter Isotron, a 10 meter Isotron, a JT-3 2/400 antenna and a Hustler



time the frame mobile antenna for 80/40/15/10. I plan to add more to the frame. I have Arrow to expand. J-Poles for 144/440 and 220 to add. I also have two 5/8 wave 2 meter sticks.

I am also thinking about another hub for 75/40/20 to use with a few of my triband rigs like the Galaxy 300, Galaxy IIIs and EICO 753s. I don't know if Procomm still sells the hubs, but I brought an extra three or four.
