spider....



Coax Connector Seal..

Last month I reported on the ARRL-HRO mini-hamfest, held at the HRO in Milwaukee. I looked through the various vendors areas and asked a simple question: Do you have a weatherproof covering for coax connectors? I was directed to this stuff we all know, that is nothing more than a gooev putty that I used in the past and was not happy with. All I wanted was a simple clip on device that covered the connectors and sealed the coax ends. I finished and headed back to the QTH, stopping at Home Depot for a few things when I spied something perfect! Halloween and Christmas decorations were all over the place and, to protect against electric shock from connected extension cords, was this device called Cord Protect. This plastic water-



proof device has a four stage rubber seal on each inlet and outlet which forms to the coax providing a sure

seal. The interior chamber is big enough to

freely house the two PL-259 ends and the barrel connector.



It is the best find for less than \$6 apiece. It works on both 8X an UG-8 cables. The putty

seal still must be used at end of line/ antenna connections. Loby-WA2AXZ
